This year Utah State University commemorates the 41st Anniversary of the Summer Citizens Program. While most students are getting a break from classes during the summer months, more than 700 senior citizens go back to school at Utah State University where they enroll in the Summer Citizens Program.

WHY IS A SUMMER CITIZEN ID CARD REQUIRED?

The Summer Citizens Program is a self-support program. The revenue collected from ID Card sales is re-distributed throughout campus departments to compensate for services provided to card holders during the summer months. A small portion of this revenue supports administrative costs of the program. Without the funds from this ID Card the Summer Citizens Program would cease to operate. As such, we are interdependent and rely on the program registrants who are actively engaged not only by purchasing the ID Card and enrolling in amazing classes at USU, but also involved in all the wonderful opportunities this picturesque hometown environment offers summer residents.

THE ID CARD AND SUMMER HOUSING?

Housing properties are contracted as sponsors of the program to provide affordable and comfortable lodging opportunities to registrants of the Summer Citizens Program. Snow Hall, Blue Square, The Factory, Alpine Flats, and University Inn currently include the ID card as part of their lease/rental agreements. In the future, all housing properties will include the ID card in the lease/rental agreement as they sponsor and support the Summer Citizens Program.

Downtown Logan is only a 5-minute drive from outdoor adventure and beauty in the Wasatch-Cache National Forest.

Logan Canyon National Scenic Byway is a 41-mile spectacular drive past limestone cliffs, the Logan River, and forested canopies to the turquoise-blue waters of Bear Lake.

The dramatic canyon provides great fishing, hunting, hiking, camping, canoeing, biking, geocaching, horseback riding, and bird-watching. Don't miss Tony Grove Lake, a glacial lake surrounded by wildflowers and a likely spot to spy a moose.

Cache Valley's dramatic landscape represents the rugged struggle to settle the American West. It's the ancestral home of the Northwest Band of the Shoshone, mountain men roamed and traded furs here in the 1820s, and Mormon pioneers settled the area in the 1850s.

Stop in at the American West Heritage Center, a 160-acre living history center and experience the history of the Old West.

Depending on the day, you'll visit with mountain men, farmers, and pioneers. Check out the bison. Museum open year-round; living history open seasonally.

Welcome to our rich cultural tapestry of performing and fine arts, nurtured and thriving since 1856. Logan was so artsy that in the early 1900s it was known as the Athens of the West.

Take in a wide variety of fantastic talent at our free Noon Music Concerts at the historic Tabernacle Monday through Friday. Concerts last about 45 minutes.

Logan boasts its own historic theatre district with three exquisitely restored theaters in just one block. You'll be impressed by the 1923 Ellen Eccles Theatre, home of Utah Festival; the 1913 Caine Lyric Theatre; and The Utah, a 1924 Art Deco masterpiece. All three are full of activity all summer long.

Take a walking tour of historic downtown Logan, where you'll find great examples of early Mormon pioneer architecture, including the temple and tabernacle, the 1923 Ellen Eccles Theatre, the 1914 Bluebird Café (the oldest restaurant in the state), impressive turn-of-the-century homes and churches, and the beautifully restored Cache County Courthouse, home of the Cache Valley Visitors Bureau.

RESTAURANTS – Logan has more than 70 restaurants to choose from, including many unique restaurants with their own specialties as well as various national food chains.

The internationally renowned Utah Festival Opera and Musical Theatre takes the Ellen Eccles Theatre stage to perform operas and Broadway shows along with concerts, classes, backstage tours, and more. Hundreds of performers from the nation's greatest stages showcase a month of spectacular performances. Don't miss *Music Man*, *Madama Butterfly*, *Pirates of Penzance*, *Hunchback of Notre Dame*, and *Seussical the Musical*.

CHURCHES – More than two dozen religious denominations welcome visitors to worship. Yes, we do have lots of Mormons here, but don't worry, they're not out to get you. You'll notice quiet Sundays with not a lot of businesses open and larger families than you are probably used to seeing.

The Caine-Lyric Theatre opened in 1913 and is home to the Lyric Repertory Company, one of the true remaining repertory companies in the nation. Each summer the talented actors and actresses light up the stage with 4-6 productions and offer a charming view of America's theatre past. This year the Repertory Company is celebrating its 50th year! Don't miss *Big River*, *The Foreigner*, *Wait Until Dark*, and *The Complete Words of William Shakespeare (abridged)*. Watch for the announcement of an exciting fifth show!

What do I do when I arrive on campus?

Park in the Big Blue Parking Terrace located on 700 North, see USU map on page 7.

Go to the Eccles Conference Center Summer Citizens Program office – basement room 103, see map on page 7.

At the Eccles Conference Center you will pick-up your USU Summer Citizens packet if you pre-registered and have had a card issued in prior years. If this is your first summer, or you were not registered in 2015 or 2016, you will receive a voucher for the ID card with instructions where to go to get the card printed.

At the Eccles Conference Center you will also pick-up your USU Parking Pass, Coupon Book, T-Shirt for those who registered online, and other program information.

Eccles Conference Center hours of operation are Monday - Friday from 8:00 am to 5:00 pm.

What is a Summer Citizens ID Card? Do I need it?

The Summer Citizens Card is mandatory. You will be asked to show your card at all times throughout the summer. It allows you to participate in any on-campus program or event. The card will be used as an identification card for campus services such as recreation facilities, fitness centers, computer labs, parking privileges, and a debit card for dining accounts and select discounts. If you registered with the program in 2015 or 2016, you must keep your Summer Citizens ID Card. Bring it with you, because the card is a lifetime card that is reactivated each year you register with the program. Everyone who did not register in 2015 or 2016 will be issued a new lifetime card.

What amenities does my Summer Citizens Card allow me to access on campus?

The Summer Citizens ID Card allows access to the Library and Computer Labs on-campus and parking privileges (campus recreation pass is optional). Be sure to take your card with you for verification.

What happens once I register for a Summer Citizens Card and Courses?

Once you have registered for a Summer Citizens ID Card and/or courses, a confirmation letter will be emailed to you. Information about Utah State University and Cache Valley, including a coupon book offering discounts to local vendors, will be provided to you upon check-in on-campus at the Eccles Conference Center.

Can I just buy one card and share it with my spouse/significant other?

Each Summer Citizen participant must have their own card. Your card is used to identify you as a participant in the program. Therefore, sharing cards is not allowed. Your picture and A# are on the Summer Citizens ID Card.

How will I know about university and community events throughout the summer?

Each authorized program sponsored apartment complex chooses one or more residents to be a Communication Council member. These members attend a bi-weekly meeting where they will receive information/flyers about upcoming events for posting on bulletin boards in your complex. If you have alternative housing, you may attend these meetings to gather this information. The first communication council meeting will be held Tuesday, May 30th at 8:30 a.m in the University Inn. Event information will also be posted on our website calendar of events at summercitizens.usu.edu.

Where can I park on campus?

The Summer Citizens Parking pass allows parking in Blue, Black, Gray, and Yellow Lots (designated by "P" on map on pag 7). It also allows 4 hours per day in the Big Blue Parking Terrace located on 700 North. Optional \$10 upgrade permit to include Orange and Green lots (designated by "\$" on map on pg 7).

Handicap accessible parking?

You must have a handicap permit or license plate to park in designated handicap stalls on USU's campus.

What is the Welcome and Orientation?

The Welcome and Orientation will be held Friday, June 2nd at 2:00 pm in the Taggart Student Center Ballroom. This is the place to learn why the ID Card holds such great value! Summer Citizens will have the opportunity to visit with university and community representatives to learn about benefits and discounts of being a Summer Citizens Cardholder. Be sure to attend!

How do I register for the Closing Social?

All registered Summer Citizens will receive an email in July 2017, with an invitation to register for the Closing Social Luncheon. The Closing Social is scheduled to be held Thursday, August 3rd at 12:00 p.m. in the TSC Ballroom.

If I'm staying at the University Inn, how will I learn about university and community events during my stay?

After each Communication Council meeting, the hotel will be given information that was distributed at the meeting. You can also find the information posted on the Summer Citizens website. Short-term stay orientations may be held for hotel guests. Visit the website for dates & times.

Do I have to stay for the whole summer or can I just stay for a few weeks?

There are some properties that offer less than a 3 month lease. Please see pages 16-17 for contract options and cost. To participate in the USU Program an ID Card is required and pro-rating is not an option.

What is the weather like?

Even on a hot day it typically cools down in the evening and stays pleasant through most of the morning. An evening breeze from Logan Canyon cools the temperatures at night.

What if I want to bring my pet(s)?



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WHY DO WE CARE: THE HISTORY AND SIGNIFICANCE OF SPORT

123	19-Jun – 30-Jun	9:00 AM – 10:15 AM	M - F	\$95.00	ENGR 101
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This course is designed for two weeks. The first week will be taught by both Professor Richard Gordin and Professor Ross Peterson. Most of the course will be spent on the Twentieth Century, but the origins will be discussed. How and why universities and high schools became involved, the professionalization of athletics, and the impact of television are all part of the course. The impact on society with such topics as integration and Title X are also included. Finally, the frightening reality and impact of permanent injury coupled with gigantic salaries and profits are analyzed. These are multi-billion dollar businesses with very few actual employed athletes. We will examine the salaries of commissioners of professional sport and college conferences-not just the athletes. Professor Ross Peterson will follow up the earlier session with a week-long analysis of how athletics and sport are reflected in literature, history, movies, and the news. The cultural impact of sport, especially baseball. The persona of the Superstar stretching from Jack Johnson, Babe Ruth, Arnold Palmer, Billie Jean King, and Michael Jordan will be discussed as creations of marketers. The unionization of team sports and the creation of free agency are elaborated upon as they effect society. This course will also explore more deeply into the phenomena of the professionalization of youth sports and how this impacts education. The course concludes with a discussion of sport and technology.

INSTRUCTOR: ROSS PETERSON & RICHARD GORDIN Dr. F. Ross Peterson is an emeritus professor of History at USU and originally from Idaho. He has taught summer courses on many occasions. His expertise is more recent US History. Peterson is an avid sports enthusiast who studies the impact of athletics on History. He is especially interested in how universities and colleges have provided opportunities through athletics for young people to achieve an education. Although baseball is his passion, he does study and follow many other athletes and how they impact history. Richard Gordin is an emeritus professor at Utah State University. He has been at the university for 36 years. He has been a professor in the department of Kinesiology and Health Science and an adjunct professor in the department of Psychology. He was the department's graduate coordinator for 15 years. Dr. Gordin has published 95 articles and book chapters and has made 370 professional presentations at state, regional, national and international conferences. He has been a sport psychology consultant for numerous athletic teams at his university, USA Gymnastics, USA Track and Field, US Ski and Snowboard Association and several professionals on the PGA and ChampionsTours. He is the former chair of the certification committee of the Association for Applied Sport Psychology (AASP). He was the sport psychology consultant for the USA Women's Gymnastics Team in Seoul in 1988 and a sport psychology consultant for the USA Track and Field Team for the 2004 Olympic Games in Athens. He recently served as the sport psychologist for the USA Nordic Combined Ski Team in Vancouver in 2010 and in Sochi 2014. During spring semester 2010 he was a visiting professor at Jagiellonian University in Krakow, Poland. 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NAVAL BATTLES OF THE PACIFIC WAR

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The class will cover the Pacific War from 1936 to August 1945 with emphasis on the great naval battles. The circumstances that led up to these battles and the aftermath. There were many minor battles such as Bismarck Sea which will be reviewed in less detail, the primary ones are Pearl Harbor, Coral Sea, Midway, Guadalcanal/Solomons, Philippine Sea, and Leyte Gulf. The Philippine Sea was critical in that it gave us a base from which we could regularly attack the Japanese mainland and we did. It was from the Marianas Islands in the Philippine Sea from which we launched the two flights that dropped bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki. The final conflict came at Okinawa when the two bombs ended the conflict. Okinawa is not known as a naval battle but the Japanese attempts to dislodge us by use of the Kamikaze were devastating but not effective enough to change the tide of that war. *Campus is closed Monday, July 24th in celebration of Pioneer Day- no classes will be held.

INSTRUCTOR: DICK CLARK graduate of USC School of Business 1960. In 1997, on retirement, he joined the Palm Springs Air Museum, a World War II air museum, as a docent and served as such until being nominated to the presidency of that museum in 2010. He served as president for nearly two years when he retired for the second time and moved to Arizona. During those years his responsibilities included touring groups through the hangars discussing the airplanes used in World War II and the key battles both naval and air. Dick presented Saturday programs, where he lectured to audiences on various battles and specific subjects relative to World War II and taught classes about World War II to newly accepted volunteers so that they would have a basis to discuss this war with museum visitors. Furthermore, he participated in the writing of training manuals and historical papers to be provided to visitors. At any given time, the museum managed approximately 350 volunteers. In 2005, Dick was nominated to the museum board of directors and served until his second retirement and move to Arizona.

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DEPARTING LOCATION - Maverik Stadium Parking Lot, NW corner. A walk around Tony Grove Lake provides an ideal setting for learning about the dominant plant communities, geologic history, and cultural practices that have shaped the landscape of the northern Wasatch Mountains. The terrain is steep and rocky, but we will keep to a trail that is fairly flat, and one that crosses a number of different kinds of habitats. The instructor is a retired professor of botany in the College of Natural Resources whose research had focused on the classification of North American flora and the distribution of native plants in Utah. 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
