Why is a Summer Citizen ID Card required?

The Summer Citizens Program is a self-support program. The revenue collected from ID Card sales is re-distributed throughout USU campus departments to compensate for services provided to cardholders during the summer months. A small portion of this revenue supports administrative costs of the program.



Common Questions

You've got questions. We've got answers.

Very Important Message:

Program sponsored apartment residents WILL need to register online to identify the apartment complex they are residing in and for all other events, or classes associated with the Summer Citizens program.

What is a Summer Citizens ID Card? Do I need it?

The Summer Citizens Card is mandatory. You will be asked to show your card at all times throughout the summer. It allows you to participate in any oncampus program or event. The card will be used as an identification card for campus services such as recreation facilities, fitness centers, computer labs, parking privileges, and a debit card for dining accounts and select discounts. If you registered with the program in 2015 or later, you must keep your Summer Citizens ID Card. Bring it with you, because the card is a lifetime card that is reactivated each year you register with the program. Everyone who registered prior to 2015 will be issued a new lifetime card in 2018.

What happens once I register for a Summer Citizens Card and Courses?

Once you have registered for a Summer Citizens ID Card and/or courses, a confirmation letter will be emailed to you. When you arrive/check-in at the Eccles Conference Center where the Summer Citizens Program office is located.

What do I do when I arrive on campus?

Park in the Big Blue Parking Terrace located on 700 North, see map on page 7, building #7. Go to the Eccles Conference Center Summer Citizens Program office—basement room 103, see page 7, building #12.

At the Eccles Conference Center you will receive a USU Summer Citizens Welcome Packet. If this is your first summer, or you were not registered in 2015, 2016, or 2017, you will receive a voucher for the ID card with instructions of where to get the card printed.

Your Welcome Packet includes a USU Parking Pass, Coupon Book, T-Shirt for those who registered online or living in sponsored housing, and other program and community information.

Eccles Conference Center hours of operation are Monday – Friday, 8:00 am–5:00 pm.

Can I just buy one card and share it with my spouse/significant other?

Each Summer Citizen participant must have their own card. Your card is used to identify you as a participant in the program. Therefore, sharing cards is not allowed. Your picture and A# are on the Summer Citizens ID Card.

How will I know about university and community events throughout the summer?

Each authorized program sponsored apartment complex chooses one or more residents to be a Communication Council member. These members attend a bi-weekly meeting where they receive information/flyers about upcoming events for posting on bulletin boards in your complex. The first communication council meeting will be held Wednesday, May 30th at 8:30 am in the University Inn. Event information will also be posted on our website calendar of events at summercitizens.usu.edu.

After each Communication Council meeting, the hotel will be given information that was distributed at the meeting. You can also find the information posted on the Summer Citizens Announcement web page. Short-term stay orientations may be held for hotel guests. Visit the website for dates & times.

Do I have to stay for the whole summer or can I just stay for a few weeks?

There are some apartment housing sponsors that offer less than a 3 month lease. The University Inn provides a 2 week or 3 week package option. Please see the 2018 Renter's Guide for contract options and cost. To participate in the USU Program an ID Card is required and pro-rating is not an option.

What is the weather like?

Even on a hot day it typically cools down in the evening and stays pleasant through most of the morning. An evening breeze from Logan Canyon cools the temperatures at night.

Astronomy for Beginners

1:30 PM - 2:45 PM \$40.00 **Course #115** 4-Jun — 8-Jun M-F **ENGR 101**

DESCRIPTION: We'll cover the history of astronomy and learn about constellations. We'll study the solar system, especially the moon, Mars, Jupiter, Saturn and its moon, and Pluto. Learn about the search for other solar systems and how our solar system formed. Learn about our sun and other galaxies, star clusters, and double stars. We'll discuss recent advances in cosmology (origins of the universe and the Big Bang), and the search for life on other Earthlike planets (exoplanets). There will be an evening star party at Heritage Park in Nibley with telescopes from the Cache Valley Astronomical Society.

INSTRUCTOR: Tom Westre is a retired public school educator with 37 years of teaching experience at the high school level. Tom received his bachelors and masters degree in education from the University of South Dakota. Tom has taught many subjects including American History and astronomy at the high school level. Tom is the past president of the Cache Valley Astronomical Society (CVAS), a group of local amateur astronomers. He has been involved with astronomy since he was nine years old. He has four telescopes and enjoys observing and astrophotography.

Hemingway's War

Course #117 4-Jun - 8-Jun 3:00 PM - 4:15 PM M-F \$50.00 **ENGR 201**

DESCRIPTION: Hemingway's life was deeply affected by war. He was wounded in WW I, and he experienced the Spanish Civil War and WW II as a war correspondent. We will read and discuss two books: For Whom the Bell Tolls, and A Farewell to Arms. Discussion topics may include but are not limited to: how war is portrayed, effects of war, and war trauma and wounds. We may also discuss: Hemingway's actions in war, other war writers and Hemingway, influences on his war perspectives, and his war correspondence. The course will end with a discussion on the class opinion of the books.

REQUIREMENTS: Read both A Farewell to Arms and For Whom the Bell Tolls by Ernest Hemingway before class.

INSTRUCTOR: Melissa Maughan is a Staff Assistant in the Utah State University's History department. She graduated with a BA in History from USU in 2013 with a specialization in US History 1900-1945 with an emphasis in Japanese Internment. She has an MA in English from USU with a specialization in rhetoric. She has a special interest in wartime and classic literature, both fiction and nonfiction.

Star's poems are published nationally. Her most recent poetry collections are Walking the Bear and Thin Spines of Memory. Star teaches poetry writing workshops and directs the Utah State University Writing Center.

DESCRIPTION: The REDBIRD full motion (3-axis) flight simulator introduces participants to the exciting life of a pilot. Each participant will be at the controls of a 200 degree visibility simulator from take-off to landing in preparation for an optional flight in a USU aircraft. Before embarking on the flight, discussions will cover the basic principles of flight, how an aircraft creates lift, and the controls of a plane. Flights will be scheduled around weather and aircraft availability in the early evenings.

REQUIREMENTS: Limited to 20 students, enroll early. Optional flights in a DA-40 cost \$100 and a passenger can come, depending on weight and balance. Flights scheduled and paid through Baron Wesemann.

INSTRUCTOR: Andreas "Baron" Wesemann is an assistant professor and professional practice instructor in the Aviation Technology Program. He arrived at USU in 2015 after more than 27 years in the U.S. Air Force. While serving in the Air Force, Wesemann worked as an instructor pilot in five different aircraft, taught German at the Air Force Academy, and instructed at Specialized Undergraduate Pilot Training. His professional interests are in areas related to aviation, including curriculum development, leadership and ethics in the cockpit, and safety and risk management systems.

How We Drill Oil Wells in Deep Ocean Waters

DESCRIPTION: In May of 2010, the blowout of the Deepwater Horizon Well in the Gulf of Mexico caused the worst oil spill in history. It raised many questions such as how are wells drilled in deep water? What are the potential hazards that exist in drilling in that depth? What went wrong with the Deepwater Horizon well specifically? What can be done to prevent future similar disasters? In this highly-illustrated presentation, Miller will take the class through the step-by-step process involved in drilling a deepwater well and offer some comments on how to prevent another uncontrolled blowout.

He quest lectures at Universities around the country and speaks about his culture to many K-12 schools sharing his knowledge of his people. He is the great-great-grandson of Chief Sagwitch who was the Chief during the Bear River Massacre. The Shoshone perspective needs to be heard.

Killing three train robbers in a shootout helped him gain national recognition. Yet Paul had his weaknesses, and we will talk about those as well. Western history buffs should know Bob Paul.

JFK Assassination: Warren Commission vs JFK Researchers

DESCRIPTION: President Kennedy's assassination has become a controversial event and we'll look at both sides. The Warren Report is the government explanation showing how Lee Harvey Oswald was the lone gunman and there was no conspiracy. Over the last 50 years, hundreds of private researchers have uncovered information not stated in the report. Why did JFK go to Dallas? Who was Lee Harvey Oswald? What is the evidence of the single bullet theory? Was Oswald a patsy as he stated? Tom Westre researched the assassination for 20 years and visited Dallas in 2013 at the 50th anniversary of the event.

INSTRUCTOR: Tom Westre is a retired public high school teacher, where he taught US History. He met JFK in 1962 when the President came to South Dakota to dedicate the Oahe Dam on the Missouri River. He recalls the day the President was assassinated and when the Warren Commission came out in 1964, he believed it. When the Oliver Stone film came out, he began to research the assassination. He's made strong conclusions about what happened that day. Tom visited Texas in 2013 for the 50th anniversary of the assassination. Tom used the event to help his students understand results of the Warren Commission and in-depth results of 50 years of research. Tom will cover both sides of the issue and help students understand this complex event.

Japanese Internment in WWII

DESCRIPTION: Two months after the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed Executive Order 9066, which led to the relocation of approximately 120,000 Japanese-Americans, many of whom were American citizens, to 1 of 10 internment camps located across the country. Some were allowed to leave beginning in 1945, and the last camp closed in March 1946. One of these camps was in central Utah. In this course, we'll discuss the timeline of internment in Utah. We'll discuss and compare primary and secondary sources. We will also briefly discuss the implications of these internment camps.

REQUIREMENTS: Bring two books: Desert Exile by Yoshiko Uchida, and Prisoners Without Trial: Japanese Americans in World War II by Roger Daniels.

A "no show" on the day of the tour will result in a loss of all fees paid with no refund. Substitutions are acceptable up to 3 days prior.

Overnight Tour Cancellations

Participants withdrawing from an overnight tour to Park City and Heber Valley must do so **in writing** (through an email) by March 1 for the June 5 tour and by April 23 for the July 30 to receive a refund less a \$90 per person processing fee. A "no show" the day of departure will result in a loss of all fees paid with no refund. Substitutions are acceptable up to 3 days prior.

Course Cancellations

Participants wishing to cancel courses must do so in writing (through an email) prior to May 18, 2018 and will receive a refund less a \$10 processing fee per course. No refunds will be given after Friday May 18, 2018. 
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
