

Noelle Cockett Steps Down

LOGAN, Utah - In case you missed it, Utah State University President Noelle E. Cockett announced in November that she is set to retire on July 1. Cockett, the 16th president of USU, has led the University since 2017.

Cockett has been a member of the Utah State family since 1990, serving as a researcher in the Department of Animal, Dairy and Veterinary Science. She became the dean of the College of Agriculture and Applied Sciences from 2002 to 2013 before serving as the vice president for USU Extension from 2006 to 2013. That year, Cockett was appointed executive vice president and provost before becoming president four years later, the first woman to lead the university since its founding in 1890.

Cockett is best known for her research on sheep genomics, winning several national awards. She was also a key part in Utah State's launch of a four-year veterinary program, securing \$18 million from the Utah Legislature for the first-of-its-kind offering at a college in the state of Utah.

In a letter to USU employees in November, Cockett said "The decades I have been at USU have convinced me that all of our amazing institutional accomplishments have been possible because of the hard work and commitment of each one of you and those who preceded you as university faculty, staff, and supporters."

A national search for Utah State University's 17th president is currently underway.

Record Low Temperatures

LOGAN, Utah - According the weather folklore, if March comes in like a lamb it is bound to go out like a lion. However, the weather in Logan as the calendar changed from January to February this year made residents feel like bundling up in the warmest fur they could find.

Temperatures dipped to as low as 29 below zero at the Logan airport as school and business openings were delayed with the frigid weather outside. The temperatures were some of the coldest Cache Valley had seen in close to 100 years, as the previous record of -25 degrees was recorded in Logan on Dec. 20, 1924.

Cache Valley is actually home to one of the coldest locations in the lower 48 states, as Peter Sinks, a natural limestone sinkhole located near Bear Lake, once registered at -69.3 degrees. That mark is the second-lowest temperature recorded in the lower 48 states. During the recent cold snap, Peter Sinks had a recorded temperature of -60.9.

The icy temperatures make us all the more excited to welcome back our Summer Citizens, as the average temperatures during the summer months in Cache Valley peak at 89 degrees in July.





True Aggie Night

LOGAN, Utah - In the musical Fiddler on the Roof, Tevye sings about tradition as a means to explain why things are the way they are. Tradition is also a major part of the experience at Utah State University and no tradition is more popular than "True Aggie Night." It's the night, under a full moon, where a couple stands atop the block "A" on the northeast corner of Old Main and kiss at midnight to achieve their status as "True Aggies."

The block "A" has been a staple of the Utah State campus since 1916, when it was introduced by the Beno Club. Although the piece moved around campus, west of the Mechanic Arts Building, to the front of the Library, to storage, to the northwest corner of Old Main and then to its present location in 1990 when stipulations for becoming a "True Aggie" were outlined.

It is now our pleasure to introduce this Aggie tradition to our Summer Citizens, although we intend to bend the rules just a bit. A full moon, in fact a strawberry moon, is planned for Saturday, June 3 - a perfect evening to share a special kiss with your special someone atop the "A" to become "True Aggies" yourself! We understand that midnight is late, so that is where we may be bending the rules just a bit.

We are looking at other times, such as 8 p.m., where you'll still be able to see your special someone in the waning sunlight. Or, come and celebrate an east coast "True Aggie Night" by sharing that special kiss at 10 p.m. (midnight in the eastern time zone). Or, would you prefer to experience the tradition in its truest form and kiss atop the "A" at the stroke of midnight?
