Aggies Take On The NCAA Tournament

March Madness. It's what provides light at the end of the tunnel during Cache Valley winters for Utah State men's basketball fans. And for the fourth time in the last five years, USU has qualified for the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament having been picked as the No. 10 seed in the South Region.

The Aggies punched their ticket to the Big Dance after advancing to the finals of the Mountain West Men's Basketball Tournament and enter the NCAA Tournament with an overall record of 26-8. USU is led by second-year head coach Ryan Odom, who will be making his second NCAA Tournament appearance as a head coach after providing one of the most memorable moments of the tournament during his first stint at UMBC.

During the 2018 tournament, UMBC, the No. 16 seed, became the first-ever team to upset the highest-ranked team in the tournament, No. 1 Virginia, with an improbably 74-54 victory over the Cavaliers.

Fast forward now to the 2023 tournament and Utah State is led by first-team all-Mountain West guard Steven Ashworth, who is averaging 16.3 points per game and is one of the nation's best 3-point shooters, connecting on a 44.3-percent clip. Max Shulga, also recognized by the Mountain West, earned honorable mention allconference accolades after averaging 12.1 points per game and finishing second on the team with 138 assists during the year.

Dan Akin made the most of his only season at Utah State after transferring from Cal Baptist for his final year of eligibility, earning the Mountain West's Sixth Man of the Year after turning in 12.0 points per game and leading the Aggies on the glass with 6.9 rebounds per game.

Overall, Utah State has made 23 NCAA Tournament appearances in school history. Watch the Aggies in their first-round matchup against No. 7 Missouri on Thursday, March 16, at 11:40 am (MT) on TNT.

Tour Feature

USU Observatory Tour

Come gaze at the stars, moon and planet with the USU Physics department. Our primary targets for this visit will be the Moon (nearly full), Venus (crescent), Hercules Globular Cluster, Wild Duck Cluster and more! There will be 4-5 telescopes set up and pointed at these various heavenly bodies for you to view.

The Observatory is located on the roof of USU's <u>Science</u> <u>Engineering Research (SER) building</u>, the observatory houses a 20-inch reflecting telescope on a computerized mount that yields clear, crisp images of faraway planets and deep space objects. The observatory's unique half-circle building, designed and constructed by USU Facilities, features a circular staircase that leads to the telescope gallery topped with a metal dome measuring 16.5 feet in diameter.

The observatory's telescope is accessible by stairs only from the SER building's rooftop deck.

Maverick Stadium Tour

Merlin Olsen Field at Maverik Stadium is an outdoor football stadium on the campus of Utah State University. It opened in 1968 and currently has a seating capacity of 25,513. Its FieldTurf playing field, installed prior to the 2022 season, runs in the traditional north-south configuration, and sits at an elevation of 4,710 feet above sea level.

Saint Patricks Day

Not wearing your green? Ouch! Thankfully as you get older the threat of a pinch on St. Patrick's Day decreases, but how did St. Patrick's Day begin?

According to Time magazine, the March 17 holiday began in 1631 when the Church established a feast to honor St. Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland. The feast was a long-time coming as St. Patrick died during the fifth century. Curiously, little is known about St. Patrick, although myths exist of him expelling all the snakes from Ireland. Born of wealthy parents in England, St. Patrick was kidnapped by Irish raiders when he was 16 and held captive for six years. Upon his escape, St. Patrick studied as a priest for more than 15 years before embarking on a mission to minister to Christians already in Ireland and to convert the Irish. St. Patrick is credited with teaching the concept of the Holy Trinity to an unbeliever by showing them the three-leaved plant with one stalk, a shamrock. The shamrock, or three-leaf clover, is the national flower of Ireland and seen on the lapels of Irishmen during the holiday.

Irish immigrants in the United States founded "Irish Aid" societies and each would put on their own St. Patrick's Day parades, before the organizations began to unite their groups and ultimately began the official New York City St. Patrick's Day parade. Today, that parade is the world's oldest civilian parade and the largest in the United States, with over 150,000 participants. Other traditions began to spread across the United States, including Chicago's annual dyeing of the Chicago River to green in 1962. That year, they released 100 pounds of green vegetable dye into the river–enough to keep it green for a week. Today, in order to minimize environmental damage, only 40 pounds of dye are used, and the river turns green for only several hours.

So, why the color green? The color is attributed to the very same shamrock used by St. Patrick and the color worn to celebrate Irish nationalism.
